Dear County Clerk,

With the passing of House Bill 4123, effective June 13, 2023, the JBCC can no longer perform fingerprint-based criminal history background checks on individuals seeking guardianship appointment.

Per Section 9. of HB 4123, Sec. 155.205, Government Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 155.205. DUTY TO OBTAIN CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD INFORMATION.

- (a) In accordance with <u>Subsection (c) and</u> the rules adopted by the supreme court under Section 155.203, the commission shall obtain criminal history record information that is maintained by the Department of Public Safety. <u>The clerk shall obtain in accordance with Subsection (b) criminal history record information from the Federal Bureau of Investigation identification division relating to an individual seeking appointment as a guardian or temporary guardian.</u>
- (b) The <u>clerk</u> shall obtain fingerprint-based criminal history record information of a proposed guardian if:
 - (1) the liquid assets of the estate of the ward exceed \$50,000; or
 - (2) the proposed guardian is not a resident of this state.
- (c) The commission shall obtain name-based criminal history record information of a proposed guardian, including any criminal history record information under the current name and all former names of the proposed guardian, if:
 - (1) the liquid assets of the estate of the ward are \$50,000 or less; and
 - (2) the proposed guardian is a resident of this state.
- (d) <u>Each proposed guardian described in Subsection (b) shall file with the commission proof of having submitted to a fingerprint-based criminal history search.</u>

Per the above-mentioned statutory requirements, the proposed guardian must provide the JBCC proof of having been fingerprinted according to their county's instructions.
